Presenting Your Home for Inspection

A helpful checklist to preparing your home

The Inside

Keep the house light and airy.

When purchasers inspect, draw the curtains, open the windows and let the sun shine in! If it's a dull day or raining, turn on a few lights, as they arrive

Keep the temperature comfortable - cosy in winter, cool in summer.

If the buyers are comfortable they'll stay longer and give your home more attention

The Outside

Keep your garden neat, tidy and well kept, this makes a great first impression and a prospective buyer's first impressions are very important.

If it's possible, give the outside of your home a good "Spring Clean."

Clean the windows, clear the gutters, wash the paint work, hose down the porch. It all helps create the right image.

Inside Checklist

- Clean walls and doors
- Repair cracks in ceilings and walls
- Dry clean carpets (where necessary)
- Create space by de-cluttering rooms
- Clean and tidy the garage and storage rooms
- Consider adding fresh flowers or bowls of washed fruit which add a charming effect
- Wash and store dishes
- Make up beds
- Pack children's toys away
- Fresh clean towels in bathroom
- Draw back curtains for more light

Outside Checklist

- Repair cracked and peeled exterior
- Repair paint work
 - Check fences are straight
 - Wash down walls and awnings
- Clean gutters
- Clean windows, screens and doors
- Place pot plants on the verandah or by the front door
- Trim lawns
- Trim the nature strip out the front and on either side
- ☐ Weed garden beds
- Remove rubbish (clippings, boxes, bottles)
- Remove clothes from the line
- Clean the barbecue
- Take pets to friend houses or restrain

Enhance your property listing with ambient night photos

Twlight/Night photography is a great way to literally show your home in a different light. It makes use of the ambient light on dusk, which eliminates high contrasting light and shadows often seen during the day, thus creating an inviting atmosphere and aesthetically pleasing images.

Night photography generally focuses on the exterior of the house. However, if permitted, we also take interior photos of any main living areas and features. Interior photos are generally of living areas, special features and sometimes the main bedroom.
